Americans (19%) report they have difficulty in communicating with someone who is hard of hearing. But it doesn't have to be that way.



Enjoy quality conversations with someone who is hard of hearing by following these simple tips:

- Get their attention before speaking: say their name or tap them on the shoulder
- Give some context as to the topic of the conversation to help them infer
- Make sure they can see your lips/stand in a well-lit area
- Enunciate; speak at a steady rate
- Keep your hands away from your face while talking
- Be patient and be prepared to repeat or rephrase
- Keep your sense of humor
