


KNOW THE SIGNS OF CARBON MONOXIDE POISONING

Most symptoms of Carbon Monoxide (CO) poisoning in pets are nonspecific—they could easily be attributed to other illnesses. It's important to keep working CO alarms throughout the home, and know the signs in your pets.*

SURVEY RESULTS

According to an August 2020 survey commissioned by Kidde and conducted online by The Harris Poll among more than 1,300 U.S. pet owners.

79%

of pet owners (i.e. own a dog or cat) don't know smoke and CO alarms should be changed every 10 years.

53%

of pet owners aren't confident they could identify the symptoms of CO poisoning in their pets.

92%

of pet owners don't test their alarms weekly as recommended.

HOW OFTEN TO REPLACE

- Smoke alarms: every 10 years
- CO alarms: every 7-10 years
- Disposable fire extinguishers: every 10-12 years
